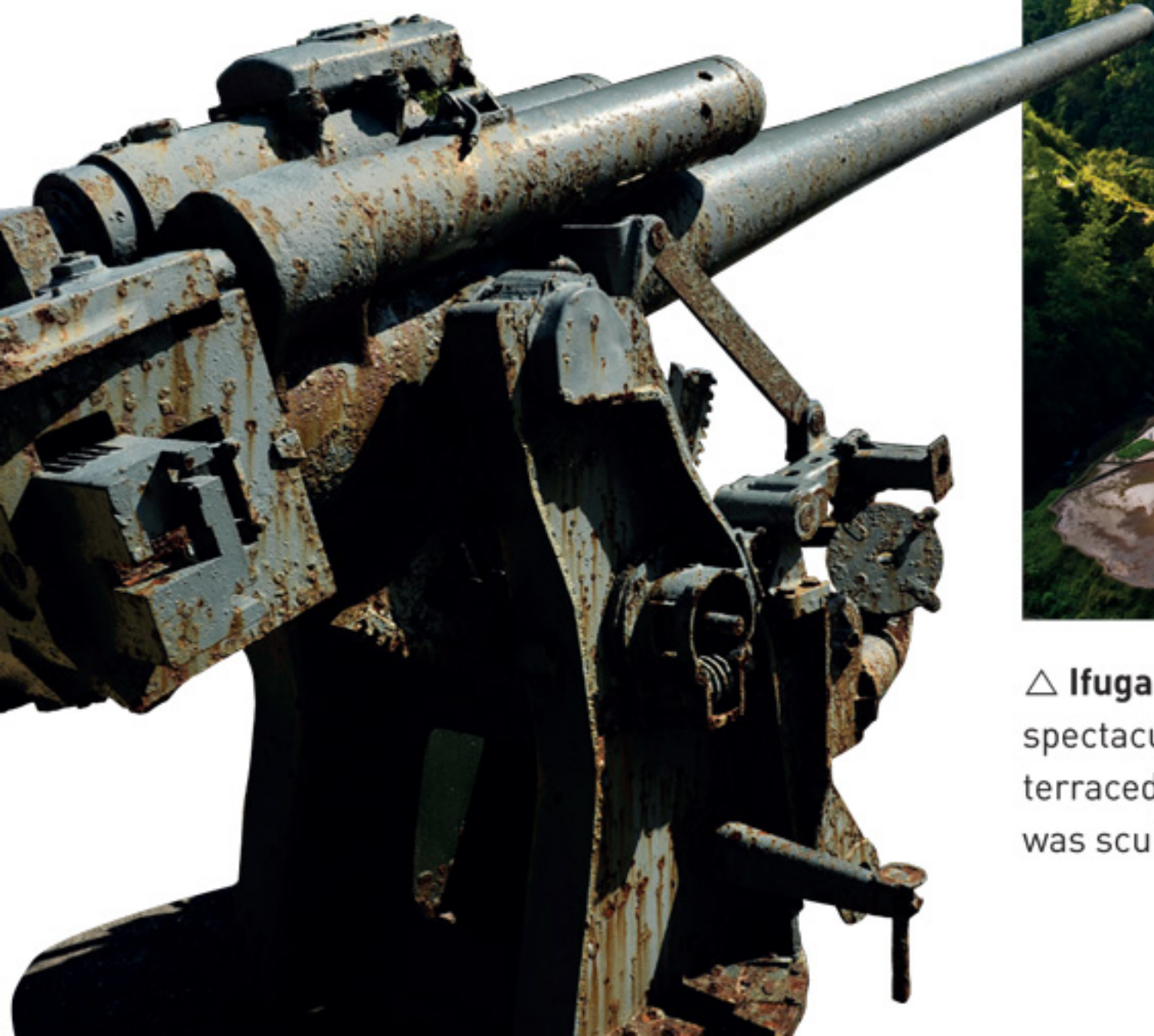

from Manila, stands out for its convenience and class A beaches. See page 145.

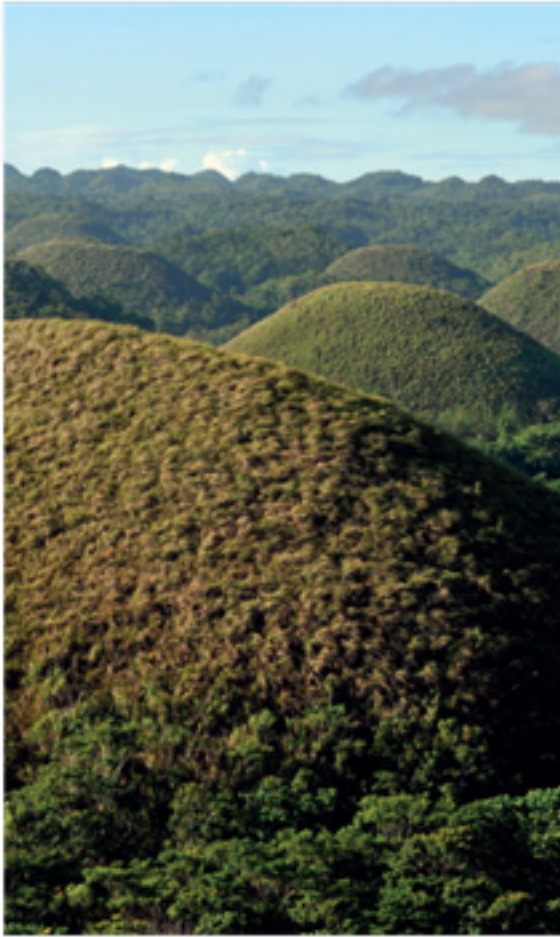

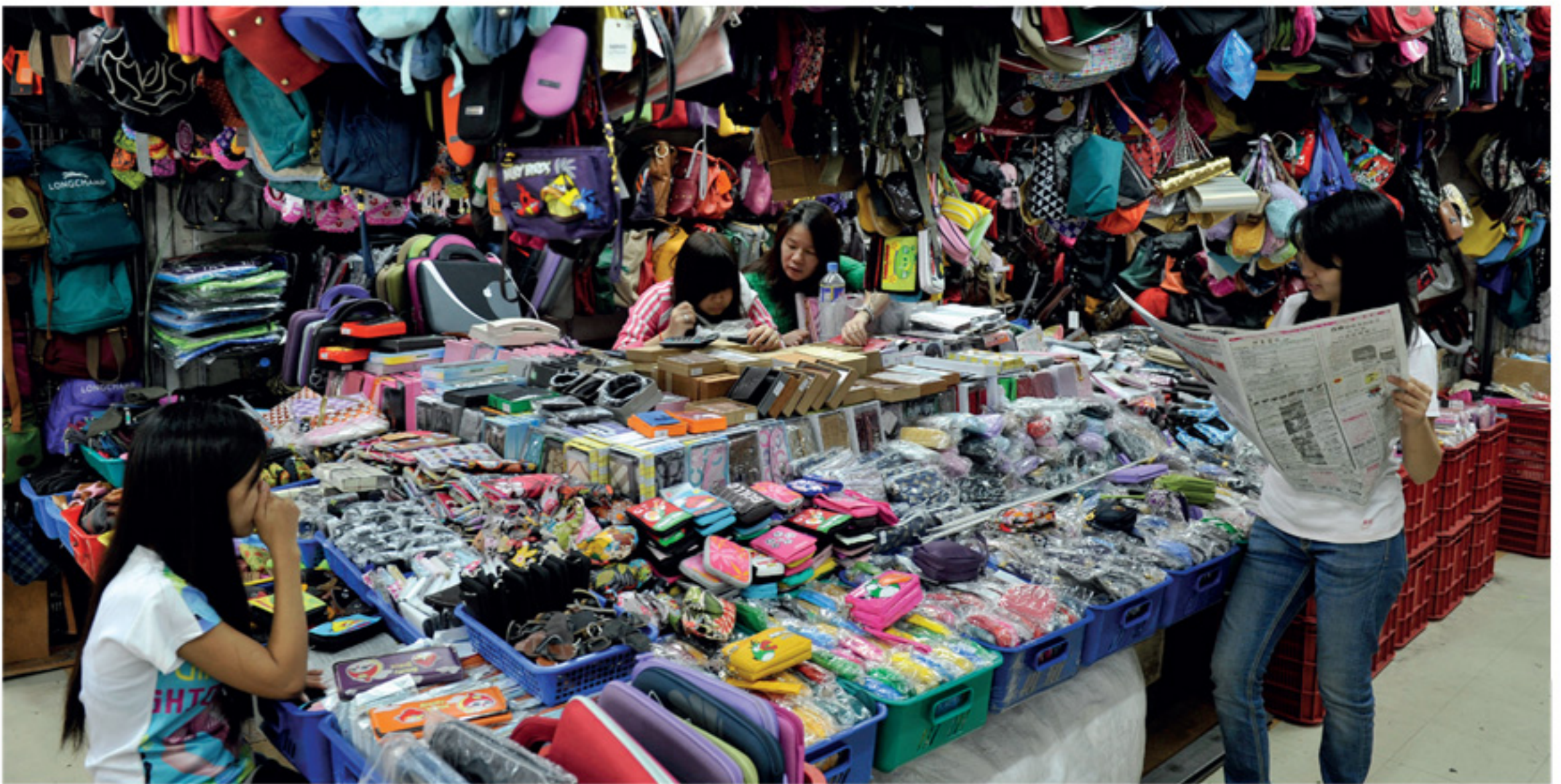

TRAVELERS' TIPS

Book ahead whenever possible. Online hotel bookings can lower room rates and guarantee a spot during holidays. Advanced purchases of ferry tickets save time standing in long lines, followed by disappointment if the boat is full.

Be assertive with taxi drivers. By law, taxi drivers should take you to a destination for the metered fare, but many won't. When a driver quotes you a set price to a

destination (contrata), it is usually around three times the normal fare.

Be firm with touts. Don't be pressured by touts, such as tricycle-taxi drivers, at airports and bus and boat terminals. Be firm about your destination, agree on the price before you begin a journey, and keep in mind that any tout's first stated price is usually bloated to test how much he can get away with. It's acceptable to

bargain down the price of a ride, likewise almost everything else for sale.

Count what comes back. Someone who is out to cheat may try to pocket the difference between a price and the amount tendered. Count your change. Errors, usually honest ones, are common.

Prepare for outages. The internet is often down in the Philippines and power goes off regularly in some regions.
