△ **Theme parks.** Disney, Universal, SeaWorld, Legoland, and Busch Gardens operate no less than 10 theme parks in Florida. At the center of the theme-park galaxy is Orlando, home of Walt Disney World Resort, which claims more than 50 million visitors each year. See pages 209 and 231.

▽ **Everglades National Park.** Encompassing more than 1.5 million acres (607,028 hectares) of subtropical wilderness, this national park sustains hundreds of plant and animal species, including endangered Florida panthers and West Indian manatees. See page 129.



△ **Key West.** The Conch Republic, Margaritaville, Mañanaland – call it what you like, Key West is always up for a party. Perched at the end of the Florida Keys, the southernmost city is a hub of colorful nonconformity where free spirits find refuge from the mainstream and the rest of us can drop in for a couple of drinks.
